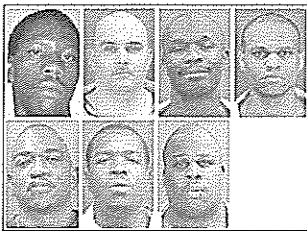
Bodies piled up during prison riot

COLUMBIA, S.C. — As the hours dragged on during a riot at a South Carolina prison, bodies piled up on the sidewalk. An inmate inside watched in dismay as several fellow prisoners, two he knew well, lay dead and dying, their bodies leaving trails of blood leading back inside the prison walls.

One bloodied man tried to get up before he "started into that 'death rattle' people often hear about, but never experience firsthand," the inmate told The Associated Press after the attack. Moments later, the dying man was silent, another casualty of the night's events.

The inmate sent messages to AP as events unfolded overnight Sunday into Monday morning at Lee Correctional Institution. At the end of the seven-hour ordeal, seven inmates lay dead, with 17 others sent to hospitals for treatment. With many cell door locks broken at Lee, a maximum-security prison, the inmate told AP he freely went out at night, where he said he saw bodies "literally stacked on top of each other, like some macabre woodpile." State officials Monday blamed the carnage on a

turf war between gangs over territory, money and contraband items like cellphones. For seven hours, Corrections Director Bryan Stirling said, inmates armed with handmade knives fought each other, leaving seven dead in the worst U.S. prison riot in a quarter-century. Most of the slain were stabbed or slashed; the remainder appeared to have been beaten, Lee County Coroner Larry Logan said.

The first fight started in a dorm about 7:15 p.m. Sunday and appeared to be contained before suddenly starting in two other dorms. No prison guards were hurt. Stirling said

they followed protocol by backing out and asking for support. It took several hours to restore order, but once a special SWAT team entered, the inmates gave up peacefully, he said.

The prisoner who saw the riot exchanged messages with AP on the condition of anonymity because he is not allowed to have a cellphone and fears retribution from other inmates. He said he saw several attackers taunt a rival gang member who was badly injured. "The man died laying on a sidewalk with some of the people who helped kill him laughing at him and taunting him," the inmate told AP.

Sex guru, follower blame US for ongoing detention

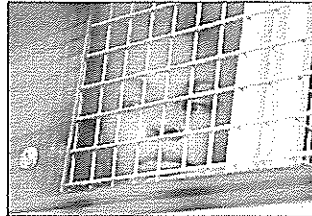

PATTAYA, Thailand — A Russian sex guru and his followers, one of whom claims to have evidence of Moscow's interference in the 2016 U.S. presidential election, were acquitted Tuesday by a court in Thailand on charges of violating labor laws but still face other charges which could land them in prison for more than 10 years.

Alexander Kirillov and follower Anastasia Vashukevich, a model and escort, told reporters they placed the blame for their continued detention on U.S. officials, to whom they previously appealed for help and political asylum. Vashukevich's earlier revelation of an alleged affair with Oleg Deripaska, a Russian oligarch close to President Vladimir Putin, fueled opposition allegations in Russia of official corruption and enraged the Kremlin.

Vashukevich claims to have audio recordings of Deripaska that provide evidence of Russian meddling in the U.S. polls.

Deripaska has been linked to Paul Manafort, Donald Trump's former campaign manager who has been indicted on money laundering charges in special counsel Robert Mueller's investigation into Russian meddling in the 2016 U.S. election.

The group was arrested Feb. 25 in a hotel meeting room in Pattaya, a Thai seaside resort city popular with Russian visitors. The sex lessons they hosted were attended by about 40 Russian tourists. Some participants wore T-shirts saying "Sex animator" in English with an arrow pointing to the wearer's crotch.

Kirillov and Vashukevich, with half a dozen other people, were taken back Tuesday to a Pattaya court from the immigration detention center in Bangkok where they are being held.

Unashamed sexual activity is business as usual for Pattaya, which is notorious for its sordid nightlife, but the allegations by Vashukevich, who uses the name Nastya Rybka on her racy social media postings,

have drawn worldwide attention.

Charges of working without proper permits were dropped Tuesday due to technicalities involving implementation of new regulations for work permits for foreigners, said a lawyer who represented the defendants and was present at their hearing. He spoke to reporters on condition that he not be named.

Foreigners found working without a work permit can face fines of up to 100,000 baht (\$3,200) and imprisonment for up to five years.

Police last week added additional charges against them of soliciting to provide sexual services, which carries a maximum prison term of 10 years, and conspiracy to solicit, which is punishable by up to seven years.

Starbucks to close stores for an afternoon of bias training

NEW YORK (AP) — Starbucks, moving swiftly to confront a racially charged uproar over the arrest of two black men at one of its stores in Philadelphia, plans to close more than 8,000 U.S. stores for several hours next month to conduct racial-bias training for nearly 175,000 workers.

The announcement Tuesday comes after the arrests sparked protests and calls for a boycott on social media. A video shows police talking with two black men seated at a table. After a few minutes, officers handcuff the men and lead them outside as other customers say they weren't doing anything wrong. Philadelphia-area media said the two were waiting for a friend.

Philadelphia police released a recording of the call

from the Starbucks employee that led to the arrests. In the recording, a woman is heard saying, "Hi, I have two gentlemen in my cafe that are refusing to make a purchase or leave." She gives the address of the Starbucks store, and the entire call lasts less than 30 seconds. In the communications between police and dispatch that were also released, someone refers to "a group of males inside causing a disturbance," and additional officers are sent.

Starbucks, which was once ridiculed for urging its employees to write "Race Together" on coffee cups to start a national conversation on race relations, has found itself through the looking glass: under fire for its treatment of black people.

The company rejected

from a high level: Starbucks CEO Kevin Johnson called the arrests "reprehensible" and said he wanted to apologize to the two men face-to-face. The company and a lawyer for the two men said they did meet, and Johnson delivered the apology. Starbucks also said the employee who called police no longer works at the store, but declined to give details.

Johnson also promised to recamp store management training to include "nonconscious-bias" education. Starbucks said its U.S. company-owned stores and corporate offices will be closed on the afternoon of May 29 for the training, which will eventually be incorporated into the instruction process for all newly hired employees.

Barbara Bush dies at age 92

HOUSTON — Barbara Bush, the mousy-haired first lady whose plain-spoken manner and utter lack of pretense made her more popular at times than her husband, President George H.W. Bush, died Tuesday, a family spokesman said. She was 92.

Mrs. Bush brought a grandmotherly style to buttoned-down Washington, often appearing in her trademark fake pearl chokers and displaying no vanity about her white hair and wrinkles.

"What you see with me is what you get. I'm not running for president — George Bush is," she said at the 1988 Republican National Convention, whose her husband, then vice president, was nominated to succeed Ronald Reagan.

The Bushes, who were married Jan. 6, 1945, had the longest marriage of any presidential couple in American history. And Mrs. Bush was one of only two first ladies who had a child who was elected president. The other was Abigail Adams, wife of John Adams and the wife of John Quincy Adams.

"I had the best job in America," she wrote in a 1994 memoir describing her

time in the White House. "Every single day was interesting, rewarding, and sometimes just plain fun."

On Tuesday, family spokesman Jim McGrath said the former first lady had decided to decline further medical treatment for health problems and focus instead on "comfort care" at home in Houston. She had been in the hospital recently for congestive heart failure and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, but now awaits valve replacement surgery and had a long history of treatment for Graves' disease, a thyroid condition.

"My dear mother has passed on at age 92. Laura, Barbara, Jenna, and I are sad, but our souls are settled because we know hers was," George W. Bush said in a statement Tuesday.

Barbara Bush was a fabulous First Lady and a woman unlike any other who brought loving, love, and literacy to millions. To us, she was so much more. Mom kept us on our toes and kept us laughing until they fell. I am a lucky man that Barbara Bush was my mother. Our family will miss her dearly and we thank you for your prayers and good wishes."

Funeral arrangements weren't immediately revealed.

After moving into the county building, Ms. Fisher said the recorder's office will be near the assessor's office, county clerk and treasurer.

"It only makes sense that all non-judicial offices are under one umbrella," she said.

"They have to make a decision, one way or the other," Ms. Fisher said. "If they don't take the Building Commission's offer, something has to happen with my office. They can't meddle in the ordinance, but they can't meddle in my office. We are short on space. This is a way out. Regardless of how this happened, the Building Commission is driving the bus now. Take them up on it. It's fiscally irresponsible for the board not to act on this."

"I implore you to put aside egos, partisan politics, and obstructive attitudes and please do the right thing."

Ms. Fisher was applauded at the conclusion of her speech.

When they got out, Mr. Keener appeared to be recording the scene with his phone or was taking pictures of it, the lieutenant said. Mr. Minor said a shot was fired, he believed by the juvenile.

He told police, Lt. Gault said, that Mr. Keener was walking toward him so Mr. Minor also fired a shot to keep him back. Mr. Keener continued forward, so Mr. Minor said, he fired again.

"Mr. Keener dropped to the ground after he (Mr. Minor) fired the second shot," Lt. Gault testified.

Mr. Keener was pronounced dead not long after arriving at the hospital, according to the lieutenant's testimony. Mr. Minor fled to a nearby house, where he was taken into custody after police surrounded the residence for several hours.

There were several people who told police they saw the shooting or the events immediately before or after the killing, Lt. Gault testified. One, from the home police surrounded, said Mr. Minor ran into the residence and said he had shot someone.

Some of the witnesses saw a gunman shoot another person before fleeing eastward, the direction of the house from the scene of the shooting.

Another witness saw the

black Impala in the area, then the white Focus. This witness said the Impala struck a telephone pole then continued on moments before the shooting.

Lt. Gault said several of the witnesses later identified Mr. Minor in a photo lineup.

Once police surrounded the house, a number of people came out during the next several hours, Lt. Gault said. Mr. Minor was the last to leave.

When authorities searched the house, they recovered two 9 mm handguns, both stolen, he said. At the intersection where Mr. Keener was shot, 9 mm shell casings were recovered.

The guns and shell casings were still being analyzed

as Tuesday he said. Authorities tried to access Mr. Keener's phone, but it was locked with a password. The FBI was working on accessing it as of Tuesday.

Before the preliminary hearing, Judge Fuhr ruled Mr. Minor was fit to stand trial based on an evaluation by Dr. Kirk Winterspahn, a Moline clinical psychologist. Questions as to his fitness were raised during a March hearing.

Mr. Minor was being held Tuesday in the Rock Island County Jail on \$250,000 bail, according to court records.

Mr. Minor's trial is scheduled for June 4, court records state. His next court date was scheduled for May 18.

Roofing's warehouse when he helped negotiate shortly after joining the city staff.

Valley and Russell have signed an IMPACT agreement with the council for the project, meaning the developer promises to use local labor and the project will be built on increased on budget.

"A lot of our members are credit unions so they have a stake in it as well," he said, adding "A lot of them probably financed their homes through IH."

For Russell, the project's design and riverfront location make the project interesting. "We're building on another statement piece in the Quad Cities," said Cathlin Russell, the company's project developer. "This is the type of building you are going to drive by and go 'Wow. These are always fun to be a part of,'" she added.
